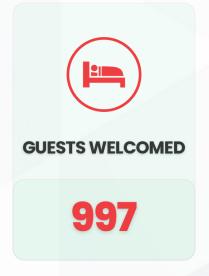
Victoria ARC is this year's community representative for the Extreme Weather Response (EWR) Program. As highlighted on the CHEK News broadcast, ARC will be providing a safe, warm, and welcoming space for community members throughout the winter season.

EWR 2025

The Extreme Weather Response (EWR) program provides lifesaving support for community members during the most dangerous winter conditions. With 30 spaces available at the Victoria ARC, individuals have access to a warm, welcoming environment, hot meals, basic supplies, and caring staff who ensure safety and dignity throughout the night. This year's EWR season runs from November to March 2026, continuing the vital work carried out last winter.

From November 2024 to March 2025, the Victoria ARC served as the community's designated EWR site, welcoming 997 individuals over 38 extreme-weather nights and providing 1,994 nourishing meals.

Thanks to the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and community partners, the EWR program remains a powerful example of compassion in action and the difference we can make when we come together to protect the most vulnerable during the coldest months of the year.

THE BIGGER PICTURE

In October, we continued to see the strength of community shine through in meaningful ways. Together, we provided 4,091 safe and welcoming stays through our accommodationsbased programs, shared 580 nourishing community lunches with the wider community, and served 9,084 meals to individuals living at the ARC. We are also grateful for the dedication of our volunteers, who contributed 81 hours of their time to support and uplift others. Each number represents real moments of connection, compassion, and hope made possible by our community coming together.

COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL FACILITY

The CRF is a halfway house and public safety program that provides a supportive and structured environment for individuals transitioning back into the community.

The program focuses on community reintegration, helping residents develop the skills and stability needed for a successful return to independent living. Working closely with community partners, CRF staff offer case management, mental health support, life skills development, counselling, employment readiness, and outreach services. The goal is to empower residents to become active, responsible members of the community.

100 % OCCUPANCY

We hit 100% capacity in October, providing accommodations and support to individuals transitioning from correctional facilities to the community.

7ADMISSIONS

We welcomed 7 individuals to the CRF program.

150 OUTREACH HOURS

We delivered 150 outreach hours. This includes counselling, employment services, housing support, ID assistance, and community activities.

PROGRAM COMPLETION

We had 4 CRF program participants successfully move out.

226

Our staff dedicated 226 hours of casework to assist clients on their reintegration journey-helping them set goals, secure housing and development, and connect with partner agencies.

RECOVERY PROGRAM

The Recovery Program is a residential, recovery-focused substance use treatment program designed to support individuals on their healing journey. It follows a structured process that helps participants build essential skills, strengthen personal resilience, and prepare for life beyond treatment. Using evidence-based approaches and community support, the program combines group work, skill development, and meaningful activities to help individuals reclaim their lives.

61% OCCUPANCY

We reached 61% occupancy, providing individuals in recovery with high-intensity programming, supportive housing, and casework services.

PROGRAM GRADUATES

4 individuals successfully completed our program.

14 hours of outings and activities that brought connection, joy, and new experiences to our residents.

Volunteers devoted 28 hours of their time to workshops and talks for participants. Residents gave 14 hours of their time volunteering in the community meals program feeding downtown.

HOUSING & SUPPORT SERVICES

Housing & Support Services provide a range of shelter and transitional housing options for individuals experiencing homelessness or housing instability. In partnership with community and government agencies, these services focus on meeting immediate needs, offering safe and supportive spaces, and helping individuals work toward long-term housing and independence.

Support includes basic needs assistance, case management, and housing navigation, as well as access to specialized programs during extreme weather. Through a combination of emergency shelter, transitional housing, and temporary housing initiatives, the program aims to provide safety, stability, and clear pathways toward sustainable housing.

STRAIGHT FROM THE SOURCE

My name is Lincoln Rajiah, and I am a client at The Salvation Army Victoria ARC

and I am currently living in Transitional Housing. I am 56 years old. I was a store manager in Victoria for over 20 years when my health started to fail.

I was living with complex diabetes in addition to several other health related challenges, and by 2023 my illnesses prevented me from continuing to work, and I had to resign. I had no income, lost my housing and started to stay in shelters. I applied for Persons with Disabilities (PWD) and was able to get into subsidized housing.

I was in a situation where I was not feeling safe due to the people who were also living in the housing unit, and I was regularly calling in police for all kinds of issues.

This took a toll on me with anxiety and increased my health needs, leading me out of province to stay with friends. My family live overseas and cannot help.

At the beginning of 2025 I had a stroke and was hospitalized for months in Vancouver. During that time, I was transferred to 3 different hospitals for rehabilitation.

When it was time for me to leave Surrey General Hospital, the hospital Social Worker was aware I wanted to go back to Victoria where I had lived and worked for over 20 years.

The Social Worker called The Salvation Army ARC to see if a bed was open in the emergency shelter. A bottom bunk in one of the dorms was available and I was sent back to the island.

I met my Caseworker Troy when I came into the shelter, and I thank God for him and The Salvation Army. I moved through the shelter process from the 18 men/9 bunk bed dorm to a private room. Troy and I meet regularly and are working on housing applications, with the goal to be back into safe & subsidized housing in Victoria.

I am still living with one sided weakness, facial paralysis, complex diabetes and other mental/physical problems but I am safe and cared for at the ARC.
